MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

Research During This Period

Research continues on serial numbers, U.S. Martial weapons, and U.S. Archive records. We are reviewing data on M1 Garands, 1903A3's, 22 caliber U.S. rifles, and National Match weapons. An additional effort is being done on Trapdoor Springfields and Krag production data..

There is a continual list of new sources that provide many additional documents on U.S. Martials. We will continue to search and recover any record that will assist in gaining additional data on as many weapon types and areas of interest on U.S. history. This will include edged weapons as well as firearms from Colonial through World War 2 and possibly the present.

We were fortunate to evaluate a current 20mm sniper rifle with optics and a tremendous range. The weapon is a bolt action rifle with 15X scope, special recoil system, complete kit with extra barrel, and ammunition. The system is non U.S. Manufacture and has been used in combat. It is capable of destroying very high value weapon, electronic, and other systems. It may be used by future U.S. forces.

Research plans include match rifles, unique test and manufacturing, and more research on pre World War One weapons.

The cover photo is a Superb U.S. Colt revolver and holster. It was given to us by Doug Carson of Des Moines, Iowa and the photo was done by photographer Paul Goodwin.

Our data base includes photos and literature on a wide variety of U.S. Martial handguns. Any interest and comments on U.S. Martial Pistols would be welcomed.

Our existing database of early muskets and militia weapons will continue with additional efforts to make information more responsive for searches, location, and identification.

Data on Books, and Web Page

Data in book form are available in volumes 1, 2, 3, and 4 of the softbound serial number books series. Volume 2 is available only as a copy. It has been out of print for several

years. Volume 4 is updated and is bigger than the original and contains more serial numbers. It is much more comprehensive than the first printing. Serial number books are available from U.S. Martial Arms Collector **Box 126 Cabin John, MD 20818**.

Springfield Research Service CD's with serial number references are available from Springfield Research Service **P.O. Box 6322 Falls Church VA 22040**.

THE KRAM RIFLE STORY, and U.S. Martial Arms Collector Magazine are available from U.S. Martial Arms Collector **Box 126 Cabin John, MD 20818**.

The Springfield Research Service web site is also available for serial number letters, and a list of services and books.

We receive requests for serial number data in book form from collectors and researchers that desire a non computer form of database that is portable for libraries, gun shows and other uses.

Springfield Target and Sporting Rifles Book

This will be an on going effort over the next year. We are continually receiving new photos and data on Springfield Match and other rifles. It will cover subject rifles from 1908 to 1942. Each fiscal year is now being processed; as well as a major gathering of photos for publication. There have been many new weapons found by individual collectors that will offer more insight into this area of military collecting.

There is a continual review of Archive data that will be evaluated for reproduction in softbound media as well as simple copies of groups of documents on a selected basis. As always, we will be printing, in the U.S. Martial Arms Collector Magazine, with as many documents and information that are available for publication.

Time is always a factor as well as demand for topics of interest. We will review many new topics. Your suggestions and contributions are welcome.

Krag Rifle Story

The second edition and the first edition are out of print.

A limited number of books are available from the Martial Arms Collector office Box 126 Cabin John, Md 20818.

Our office and several book dealers, still have a small number in stock.

A review of the book and its contents are planned for next year. Any inputs, data, and ideas are welcome but, there are no plans to publish any new books until a complete review is finished and a decision is made concerning a new effort.

We have several subscription orders or renewals on hand with no name or address. The post office returns mail with no forwarding address and it appears that the official forwarding time is getting shorter. If you are aware of any request, subscription, or book, that has not been received, please contact us and we will get it out as soon as possible. We are still finding some old hand written notes that are in limbo. Every effort will be made to answer all requests and we look forward to any comments and inquiries.

Civilian Marksmanship Program

The CMP will continue to have tables and displays at selected gun shows throughout the U.S. The show at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania was a fine success. The CMP displayed hundreds of M1 Garand rifles in all grades from rack to collector standards. Included were 1903 Springfields, 1903A3 rifles, 1917 Enfields and a catalogue of prices, standards, parts, and accessories. At times, there were

customers standing three deep to examine the weapons. Gages were available to check throat and muzzle condition and helpful personnel answered questions on condition and serial number ranges.. There were six CMP employees and four volunteers. The weapons could be selected by a buyer and tagged for his purchase. A sixty day period will be offered to fill out CMP paperwork, payment, and CMP qualifications. Upon paper work completion, a weapon would then be shipped to your address. The prices of Garands ran from \$ 295 to \$ 1400. There were seldom encountered Garands in "new" condition. The CMP continues to sell 1903, 1903A3, and M1 Garand Rifles. Special provisions are available for World War II Veterans.

CMP also has 22 caliber target rifles available on a random basis. We are going to keep up contacts at CMP to let collectors know of any new military items for sale. Phone number for CMP is 888 267 0796. Email-www.odcmp.com.

Little by little each piece is being looked at to see if recovery is possible and conversion is being made. Some data is being manually reentered.

United States Army Heritage & Education Center

The military facility in Carlisle, Pennsylvania is home to this new and upcoming research center. The History Institute opened on 2 August 2004 and has had a great deal of history and research for visitors. To take advantage of the reading room, computer facilities and reference facilities, a visitor has access to the Carlisle Barracks reservation and does not need to go through the Post Security.

There is an on going fund raising effort to start the new building that will house a significant Museum facility. This part of the OUTREACH PROGRAM that will raise PRIVATE funding. There are a limited number of exhibits in another location at Ridgeway Hall.

The History Institute is located off of interstate 81 in Carlisle, PA. Again no post security facilities are necessary to gain access to the Institute building.

There are many plans underway to have more facilities, artifacts, and documents. The quality and volume of data is outstanding and the personnel are great.

CORRECTION: Krag rifle serial number 42 199 was made in October 1896.

U.S. Springfield Model 1903 Serial Number 2538.

Would anyone have information on this weapon. The Heritage Center is interested in data and the location of the weapon.

I now have 2 rifles, one in a 92 stock (converted) and one in a 96 stock. both appear to have been together forever and so I feel they are "right". Question is; are these two variants and worthy of keeping as such or is the variation in lumber not considered significant? I guess my real wonder is if the conversions are evolutionary or randomly worked over at the arsenal regardless of any other factors.

We believe that the 92/96 conversions were done by the U.S. Government as a necessary upgrade to standardize Krag rifles to a standard. They are a correct arsenal conversion and hold a spot in Krag collecting. Comments from our readers are welcome on this subject.

Magazine Review

DOUBLE GUN JOURNAL

This is by far a quality quarterly magazine for the double gun owner. Publisher is Daniel Philip Cote'. The first issue premiered in 1989 and distribution is in more than 40 foreign countries. Issues are concerned with Double & Single Shot Guns and rifles...all makers worldwide.

Cost is \$ 39.95 for a year.

There have been several inquiries concerning Springfield Trap-door shotguns including rifle length and carbines as well as Double Barrel Shotgun bayonets from the Civil War. Perhaps an article can be generated based on U.S. Martial Arms in the shotgun field.

TULSA GUN SHOW had a serious theft of gun parts. Approximately \$ 40,000 of gun parts were stolen, including a trailer, from Tennessee Gun Parts of Atoka, Tennessee. Police theorize that owner, Layne King was watched as he left the show and headed home on Sunday 4 April. Mr. King stopped at a nearby restaurant and the thieves cut the padlock and stole the trailer. A complete listing of parts is on his website www.tngunparts.com.

More Rough Rider Guns

In something of a coincidence we received two requests for Rough Rider gun documentation letters in the same week during the past quarter. One was for a Model 1896 Krag carbine and the other was for a Colt Artillery Model revolver, both from Company G of the 1st U.S. Volunteer Cavalry.


The Colt Single Action Army revolver was serial no. 132607, which the records of the Army Adjutant General's office show was issued to Private Frank F. Healey. Frank Healey was born in Cambridge, MA and was 30 years old when he enlisted on 14 June 1898 in Tampa, FL. The Regimental Descriptive Book shows he was 5' 9 3/4" tall with a fair complexion, blue eyes and "mixed gray" hair. His civilian occupation was as a civil engineer. Healey listed his next of kin as Mrs. Frank F. Healey of 587 Bedford Ave., Brooklyn, NY. The regimental records show that Healey was issued Krag carbine serial number 68414 and miscellaneous other clothing and equipment on 20 June 1898. He was issued his Colt on 9 July 1898. Unfortunately Healey fell ill almost immediately, first with diarrhea and then with malaria, and was discharged on

15 September 1898 without leaving the continental U.S. Since documenting the revolver the owner has sold it in an Internet auction for approximately \$24,000.

The Springfield Krag was serial no. 74756, issued to Private Alfred J. Conover.

This soldier was born at Fort Sill, OK, and was a 27 year old cowboy from Liberty, New Mexico Territory when he enlisted on 23 June 1898. His record of enlistment shows that he was 5' 4 1/2" tall with a fair complexion, blue eyes and brown hair. He was not married at the time and gave Abraham Conover of Chicasee, Indian Territory (OK) as his next of kin. Conover's service record does not indicate any absences during the regiment's brief service, so it can be assumed he was present during the Cuban campaign. He was mustered out of service with the rest of the regiment on 15 September 1898. The records also show that Conover was also issued "Six Shooter" (Colt SAA revolver) serial number 3927.

Rear site-leaf of NM quality without volley sighting notch. Reversed Safety. Headless cocking piece.

Bolt etched with special engraving tool with rifle serial #. (Burned into bolt, as opposed to the use of a "vibrating" engraving tool). Rear-swivel is Black Parkerized. Stock is low-wood with finger-grooves and 2 recoil bolts.

Trigger is Black Parkerized. Trigger-Guard and Floor-Plate are Black Parkerized. Windage/Elevation Knobs: dished. diameter of windage knob is .575" Site leaf and base are Black Oil Quenched


Sling Swivel is Black Oil Quenched, milled, solid shank.

Middle band is milled, Niter Blue finish with "U" and solid screw tip. Band Spring is milled, Niter Blue finish. Bayonet Lug/Front Band is Black Parkerized with "H" present. Barrel is Black Parkerized.

Cocking piece is Black Oil Quenched. Safety is Water Quenched. Magazine Cut-Off is Water Quenched, block lettering, "ON" face is polished. Receiver is Black Parkerized

Handguard has site-line clearance cut and is concave with 17.5" radius (straight)



1903 HOFFER THOMSON RIFLE


(This rifle is an exceptional example of a test or experimental rifle with extensive trigger work and micrometer adjustments. No additional data has been discovered to date. The quality of the work is of SPRINGFIELD quality).

The micrometer drives a worm gear that moves an interior piece (missing) which transverses in the two



crescent cuts in the trigger housing. The missing piece moves another part (which is present) and serves to lessen or increase the sear engagement. All the work is professionally done and the entire rifle is original in every respect. The serial # is 96866 and the Bbl. date is 3/08.




It is suggested that specimens of this sight may be preserved in some military museum in the United States. Any information which can be supplied on this subject will be greatly appreciated.


